

Some Reasons PHSAA Endowed Scholarships are established!

The Randy A. Neumann '76 Memorial Scholarship Award was established in 1995 by the Nemann family. Randy graduated from Peoria High School as Valedictorian in 1976. He served on Student Council, was artistic, lettered in sports, participated in numerous organizations, and received significant honors during his high school career. Since Randy had been an outstanding all-round student, the annual scholarship is given in his memory to a similar student. The Peoria High principal and head counselor together select an outstanding senior headed to college or a university, who has achieved academic excellence, demonstrated exemplary leadership, shows compassion and genuine interest in others, and is a charismatic, energetic individual who inspires others. This scholarship fund began with \$5,200 from family and friends and now totals nearly \$59,000. To date, 24 students have been awarded a total of \$33,750 in scholarship money.

Gerald "Jerry" D. Stephens '51 Endowed Scholarship was established with \$50,000 in December, 2017. Jerry passed on 8/20/18 at 86. He was the President and founder of RLI Corporation in Peoria. His philosophy to all his employees was to give the best possible customer service. He was a loyal donor to PHSAA and other community organizations throughout his life. His most important asset was that he was kind, always professional, and a complete gentleman. He wanted to give back to PHS graduates who excelled as leaders in their class and other activities, were in the top 10%, were self-motivated, well-rounded, and who needed financial assistance. The student, Kimmi McCray, was the first recipient this year receiving \$3,000.

Craig H. Pope Memorial Scholarship was established in 2018 with \$100,000 in memory of Craig H. Pope, son of Ken (Sheri) Pope, PHS class of 1963. Craig passed away in 2017 and this scholarship was endowed to ensure his name lives on. Craig's major at Illinois State University was education and this scholarship is awarded to deserving students majoring in education, accounting, or business administration. The 2019 award was granted to Rue Lonergan, a PHS graduating senior with an excellent grade point average who also balanced school work with significant leadership and sacrifice at home helping care for several siblings. 

“Buck Laukitis ‘81, Alaska fisherman and Father of ‘Salmon Sisters’ Hasn’t Forgotten Peoria Roots

Buck Laukitis left his hometown almost 40 years ago to head west to Colorado to play college hockey. After that he headed to Seward, Alaska, where he began learning how to become a commercial angler. Laukitis and his wife, Shelly, eventually settled where the Alaska mainland meets the Aleutian Islands, near a village with 35 residents, surrounded by a national wildlife refuge. Their daughters were born early in 1990s, and they were exposed early to life on the water. He and his family operate Magic Fish Co., based in Homer. Laukitis' daughters, Claire Neaton and Emma Teal Laukitis are better known as the “Salmon Sisters.” For most of the summer and autumn, they and their family fish for salmon and halibut in Prince William Sound and the Bering Sea. The rest of the time is spent operating their Alaska-and fishing-inspired clothing business, on-

line and in two retail stores in their native state. They were featured in a TV commercial for Microsoft, making their papa, a 1981 graduate from Peoria High School very proud. The commercial aired on Sunday Night Football, The Golf Channel, and Saturday night live. Their grandfather Mike Laukitis'60, who is semi-retired from aluminum cast company in Pioneer Park in Peoria. Buck stays plenty busy with his fishing and his service on the North Pacific Fishery Management Council, to which Alaska governor Bill Walker appointed him in 2016. He hasn't been home for 7 years, but took time to write a letter of appreciation, along with his teammates, for his former football Coach, Larry Lavery's retirement. “I love Peoria,” Laukitis said. He has fond memories of the Grandview Drive view looking across the Illinois River.



As a result of his efforts, Mike is respected by his students, athletes, colleagues and the Peoria Community. Mike is very appreciative of all the kindness and loyalty extended to him by the students of PHS for the past thirty-four years.

Steve King '69 passed on April 2018, but his family honored him with a bridge and ceremony at Kellogg Golf Course. Nicknamed "Reno" and once dubbed "The King of Cheers" by the Journal Star, is buried just 1.5 miles from Kellogg. Quite fitting as Golf was his passion, and he had a brick at Busch Stadium, on which was written "We play 9." There is a creek that runs along between the fairways on holes 8 and 9 at Kellogg. If you slice from the tee on 9, your ball could very well land on the other side of the creek, on No. 8. For years that meant a running leap from one embankment to the other to play or retrieve one's ball. But now the Steve King Memorial Bridge rests there, a tribute to one man, and a merciful path to assist many others in their walks to shame to the land of out-of-bounds. She practiced for 32 years in Central IL, and for over seven years in Berlin, New Hampshire, and underserved area. She has been married for over 38 years to a Peoria attorney, also now retired, and has three children.



Peoria High Spends a Day with a Legend in Equipment Heaven

Coach Tim Thornton and the PHS Football team and his staff were bussed to Des Plaines to the giant Riddell headquarters of football equipment in April, 2019. Peyton Manning, the brand ambassador, surprised Coach Thornton and sat down to interview him for 20 minutes. "He wanted to know why we always go for two points on a conversion. Why we go for it on fourth down so much. Why we play at such a high tempo." Every year Riddell helps out high school football programs, but this year the company chose only one team—Peoria High School. The company proclaimed the Lions its "Team of the Future." "They sent a professional video crew to Peoria to shoot our field, our practice facility, talk to us about our practice methods, our training table regimen, our program support from fans," Thornton said.

Then Riddell paid for breakfast and lunch and walked the team into football heaven where they met Peyton Manning and the kids just went wild. Then they started wheeling in stuff which was amazing. They received 55 helmets, most worth \$400 each, but 12 of them were Precision Fit helmets that go for \$1700 each. There were boxes of shoulder pads, 60 in all, at \$300 a pop. There were also Girdles with fitted pads for underneath the

pants, 115 in all. Pants for the freshman team, jerseys for the games, travel bags and suits for off the field and equipment game night operations on the field too. They gave them new jerseys for the entire varsity team, and created two special jerseys for coaches. One week in the upcoming season, they are going to have a Throwback Night where they wear a jersey inspired by the 1952 Central team. A second night, they will have a special jersey as part of an outreach to support the police in the community. Riddell also provided PHS with high tech equipment it can use in practice to track the hits individual players are absorbing. Coach Thornton said "We can't thank them enough. This means so much to us."

In August, 2019 Peyton Manning and representatives from Riddell came to PHS to have Manning work with the team on the field practicing with the Quarter Backs tossing the football. The staff and alumni administrator were able to meet and shake Peyton Manning's hand. Such a class act and this indeed was the icing on the cake for all of us. This is something these students will never forget. Like any good coach, Thornton has awarded the boys with these gifts when they have followed the rules, kept practice dates etc., and worked hard in practices.

Peoria Native Retiring as Broadcaster for L.A. Clippers

Ralph Lawler '56 graduate of Peoria High ("Sorry it will always be Central to him.") is retiring this year from his announcing more than 3,000 NBA games. Lawler 80 has been on a farewell tour in 2018-19 as he broadcasted his 40th season of Los Angeles Clippers hoops. He also

called games for in the four major U.S. sports leagues – NFL Chargers, MLB Phillies, NHL Flyers, and NBA 76ers Clippers.

Lawler grew up in Peoria, attended Bradley University, and was a big basketball fan. He

played basketball at PHS and pickup games with about 25 guys in DePaw, IN, one of which was Oscar Robertson, one of the great basketball players. It was then that he was humbled and realized very quickly which side of the game he needed to be on – the sideline. He then began to launch his career in broadcasting. His opinion on two of the greatest players would be Michael Jordan and LeBron James.

Lawler still comes back to Peoria, with his wife, Jo-who travels on the road with him to games- every few years. He always visits Sky Harbor to dine on their catfish, and Fairview Farms Restaurant for their delicious fried chicken. He has many fond memories of growing up on Biltmore Ave, playing sport board games, of which he would deliver a play by play as part of those games. He was a natural in the making.

He was inspired by the many great broadcasters like Chick Hearn, Tom Kelly, and Jack Brickhouse, who came through Peoria. Lawler's trade-

mark calls were: "Bingo!" for a made 3- pointer. "Lawler's Law," which he invoked on air when a team reaches 100 points. And "Oh me, Oh my" when something troubling happens in the game.

Lawler, of course, knows Shaun Livingston, who played for the Clippers and suffered a devastating leg injury early in his career. He commented on what a terrific, quality man he was then and is today. He admired Shaun's strength, and faith to heal and comeback and play all over the league, and earn his championship rings.

Lawler certainly has a Hall of Fame resume winning three Emmys, a Telly, and literally seen the NBA from its' birth. He preferred broadcasting with a mike instead of a headset. He is a member of the Southern California Sports Broadcasters Hall of Fame, the California Sports Hall of Fame, Bradley University Sports Hall of Fame and his Peoria High School Athletic Hall of Fame. He also earned a star on Hollywood Walk of Fame in 2016.

Kirk Wessler '73 left his sports editor post at the Journal Star after four decades in journalism. He has left behind an immense legacy of leadership, hard work and masterful storytelling. The hall of fame writer and editor led the National Basketball Writers Assoc. of America and won countless awards; he led a sports department that every year won even more. Wessler has moved on (he's about to begin a gig writing for OSF Health –Care), but his spirit remains in the bones of the PJS newsroom, and his stories remain in the bloodstream of the Peoria area, forever. 


Slam Dunk Classy Move from Shaun Livingston '04



In December 2018 he was a part of a simple gesture in San Francisco Bay Area by taking three families and their kids on a shopping spree at Levi's store. Each family was gifted \$1500 each to go shopping with Golden State Warriors cheerleaders as a reward for their progress at Oakland Elizabeth House. The home serves as a residence for women and children who've experienced homelessness, violence, or addiction. The families

were stunned and grateful to see Livingston. The families also received signed jerseys and game tickets from the Warriors. (Excerpts Journal Star, Dave Eminian)





– Has been recently appointed as director of athletics for Peoria Public Schools. Guyton will oversee the athletic programs of the district's primary and middle schools.

In June 2018, Guyton, a former Big Ten Player of the Year and consensus All-American at Indiana, joined the men's basketball coaching staff at Loyola (Md.) Prior to that he served as Northwestern University's director of player development. Guyton has had a standout career as a Hoosier, which saw him lead Indiana to four straight NCAA tournament appearances. He has played with the Chicago Bulls, Golden State Warriors, & a seven year career in Europe playing in Italy, Israel, Croatia, Greece & Sweden. He was a coach at Illinois Central College & assisted at PHS before coaching the Central IL. Drive in the Premier Basketball League and lead them to PBL titles in each of his three seasons. The Warriors thanked Shaun for his immense contributions as a team member as he always carried himself as a professional. "His resume indicates that he's one of only a handful of players in league history to win at least three NBA championships," stated Joe Lacob, the Warriors majority owner. "Shaun was a huge part of the three NBA championship teams with the Warriors, but his overall journey is what is most remarkable," Lacob said in a statement. Gone but not forgotten

Robert Lowder '40 passed on May, 2019. Dr. Lowder was a Bradley University Emeritus Professor of Psychology. He graduated from PHS at 16 and was drafted into the US Army in 1943 and initially trained as a medic. Bob was selected for the Army's rigorous Specialized Training Program, which provided extensive academic preparation in engineering from the universities of Arkansas and Texas A & M and prompted a variety of military assignments, one of which included interviewing returning WWII veterans under the tutelage of a respected Army psychiatrist. After receiving his master's degrees in psychology from Bradley and PhD in industrial psychology from Purdue University, he began his Bradley career in 1956 which spanned 36 years. He was honored in 2016 as the Department of Psychology's Distinguished Alumnus for his ongoing service and support to the department at Bradley University. He was an accomplished sportsman and was active well into his 80s. His greatest satisfaction, however, came from helping students maximize their potential and seeing the fruits of his labors when they returned to visit or sought his advice and counsel. David E. Connor '42 passed on July, 2019. "Polish your corner of the world," became words that David Connor lived by throughout his life, in both word and deed. He believed in people and encouraged them to be the very best they could be. He started his education in a one room school house and quickly excelled graduating from PHS at the age of 16. He worked hard to pay for his education's first year at Yale University. Then with the outbreak of WWII he joined the Navy, attended Midshipman School at Columbia University, and went on to serve as an Officer on the USS Caribou. He graduated in 1945 with a Bachelor of Arts in International Studies. He was CEO of Commercial National Bank, and later launched the David E. Connor & Assoc. Financial Consultants. He invested much time and talent in the many Peoria area civic organizations and was known for his brilliance and fairness in business. He was also a mentor to many of our leaders in the community. For recognition he received the PHS Distinguished Alumni Award, and the Bob Michel Lifetime Achievement Award along with numerous other awards. He was a Sunday school teacher and a member of the St. Paul's Episcopal Church of Peoria. (Excerpts Journal Star)

Richard "Dick" Bogard '44 passed on November, 2018. It was always Dick's ambition to be a major league ball player: He had all the credentials. He was an outstanding baseball player at PHS and was proud to say he was the starting pitcher all four years. He had 3 pitches –a fast ball, a "nickel curve," which was later called a "slider," and his best pitch was a "fork ball" which is now known as the "split finger" fast ball. He was inducted into the PHS Sports Hall of Fame and was nearly drafted by the Boston Red Sox. He served as a rifleman during WWII in France. It was winter and bitterly cold and snowing. One night, after coming into contact with the enemy on a bridge, Dick fell into the water. He was pulled out and from that point on, he could not get his feet dry because he had combat boots instead of snowpacks. His feet became severely swollen thus Dick was sent home. He was awarded the Bronze Star, French Croix de Guerre, Presidential Unit Citation, Combat Infantryman's Badge, two Battle Stars, and later received the French Legion of Honor Medal. He then graduated from University of Michigan in 1950 from the School of Pharmacy. He became the CEO of five Bogard Drug Stores in Central IL. (Excerpts Journal Star)


Frederick Genge PhD, PHS Teacher/Coach passed on December, 2018. He was a teacher and coach for over 35 years at PHS. He also taught at St Mary's in Kickapoo, ICC, and ISU. Frederick coached soccer, tennis, pole vaulting, and kickers with varsity boy's football. He was instrumental in starting boys soccer and girls track. He shall always be remembered by many of his students. (Excerpts Journal Star)

Gerald Stephens '51 – passed on August, 2018. Jerry was the founder and retired chairman of the board of RLI Corp., a nationwide specialty property and casualty insurance company headquartered in Peoria, IL. He graduated from University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1955 and served in the army in the Korean War. "Jerry was a visionary leader whose passion for the specialty insurance business was inspirational to the thousands of employees, insurance producers, business partners and community partners his life touched during his more than 50 years in the insurance industry. He was a dedicated philanthropist who cared deeply about his community," said RLI CEO Jonathan Michael. Jerry received many recognitions throughout his life, including Distinguished Alum from Peoria High School Alumni Assoc. Before his passing he endowed the Stephens Scholarship with the PHS Alumni Association and donated regularly to sustain the Dr. John & Betty Tinthoff Endowed Scholarship. The Tinthoffs were his PHS classmates from 1951 who died in a plane crash in 1999. Jerry attributed RLI's longtime success to the people of the organization and the philosophy of "the customer is king." When once asked what legacy he wished to leave on this planet. Jerry responded: "I believe we are put on the earth to serve others. Our rewards in life are in direct proportion to the service we are able to provide. I would hope to be remembered as a servant of our family, our people at RLI, our customers and our community. 
Abrin Schaad '2010
